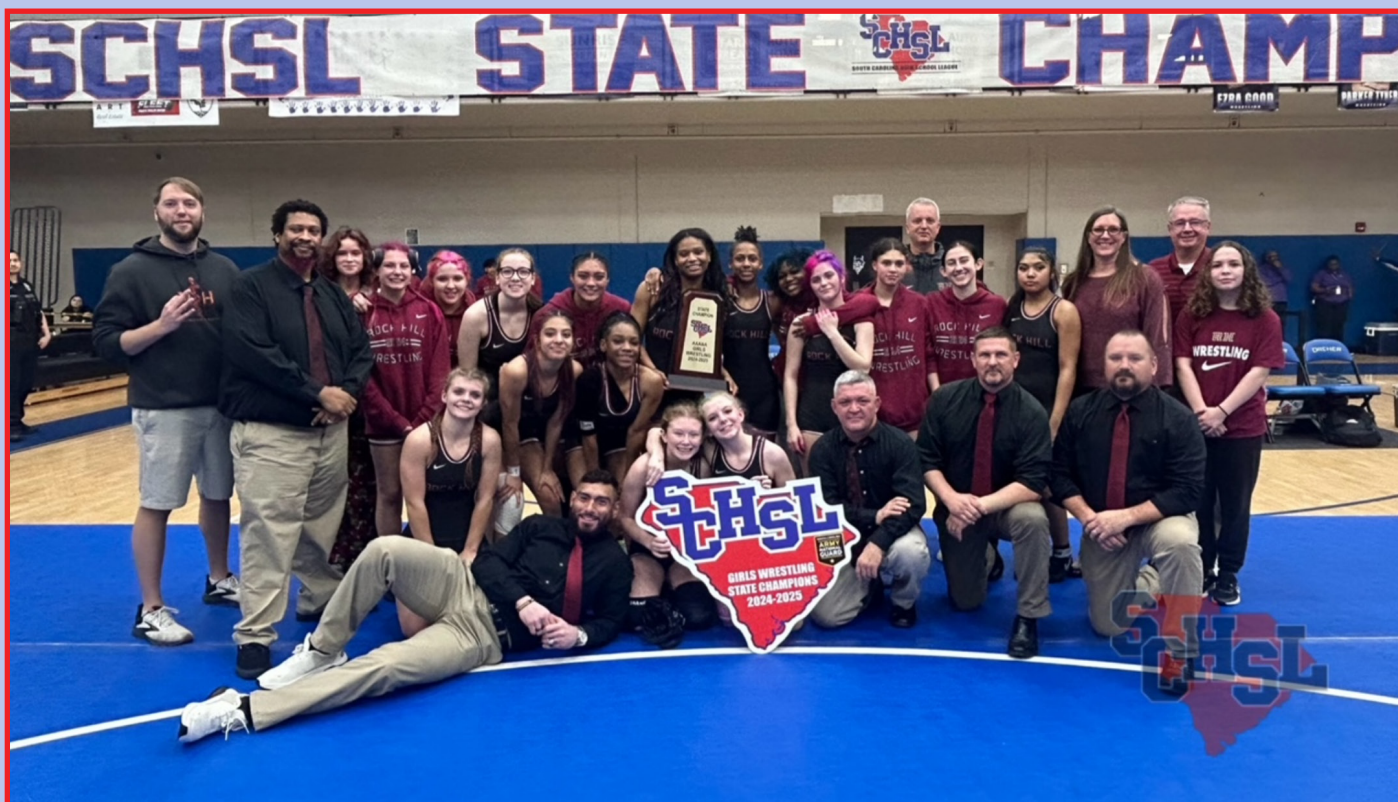

CONGRATULATIONS!!!...to the membership for creating and navigating these memorable experiences throughout the year.

Some of life's most unforgettable moments unfold during school activities, and the SCHSL family has had numerous opportunities to celebrate accomplishments and rise to meet unexpected challenges. I am truly honored to be part of these meaningful experiences.

The 2024-25 sports seasons brought significant changes. Most notably, our largest classification, AAAAA, was split into two divisions for the state finals, allowing us to crown additional State Champions in Division 1 and Division 2.

For the second consecutive season, the semifinals and finals in both boys' and girls' basketball were held at a single location providing fans with the opportunity to watch 36 games over a nine-day period. In addition, semifinal teams were given the chance to practice on the court where they would compete prior to the games, enhancing their preparation and experience.

Throughout the 2024-25 season, we remained committed to promoting sportsmanship across the membership. In conjunction with the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS), we continued our efforts to minimize ejections and suspensions through the #BenchBadBehavior campaign, a message that resonated throughout the seasons.

This year, we also expanded the Commissioner's Chat, which was introduced in 2023-24, by bringing staff members into the conversation and renaming it Commissioner's Chat & Beyond. This occasional chat, gave the membership, fans, and their communities a transparent look at the changes and happenings of the SCHSL.

The motto, **#WeAreSCHSL**, continued to resonate across social media platforms and official documents from the League office. It embodies what we stand for as an association, where the "We" includes the student-athletes, coaches, administration, and fans who make up our League.

This Annual Impact Report serves as a snapshot of the celebrations and challenges of your South Carolina High School League family. Looking ahead to the 2025-26 season, let us always remember the power of teamwork and how we can continue to make history when we work together.

# 2024-25 PRIORITIES

## **PRIORITY NUMBER 1**

**Explore a more simplified transfer bylaws that can replace most of the current transfer bylaws.**

### **Actions Taken**

**The following actions were taken to address priority number 1:**

- A committee of eight (8) members was created with two (2) representatives from each association (superintendents, principals, athletics directors, and coaches).
- The committee met on three occasions (1 virtual and 2 face to face)
- The committee reviewed the current transfer bylaws process and requested copies of transfer bylaws processes used by other organization and/or associations.
- After reviewing all documents, the committee drafted a new document outlining proposed bylaws.

## **PRIORITY NUMBER 2**

**Explore and define differences for ejections because of unsportsmanlike conduct versus other types of ejections. Applies to coaches and athletes.**

*\*Note: Impacts additional penalties imposed by the League Office.*

### **Actions Taken**

**The following actions were taken to address priority number 2:**

- The League staff reviewed the sanction or suspension of athletes and coaches for ejections because of unsportsmanlike conduct in all sports.
- The staff reviewed processes used by other organization and/or associations to address unsportsmanlike conduct by athletes and coaches that results in ejections.
- After reviewing all documents, the staff created a document that proposes a change to how unsportsmanlike conduct resulting in ejections is addressed for athletes and coaches.

## **PRIORITY NUMBER 3**

**Give authority to SCHSL Commissioner, Dr. Singleton, to work with State Legislators on behalf of the Executive Committee in crafting Bills that may affect the SCHSL.**

### **Actions Taken**

**The following actions were taken to address priority number 3:**

- The SCHSL has a contract with a lobbying group, Capitol Information Affiliates (CIA), to work with the Commissioner in building relationships with key legislators in addressing proposed legislations that may affect the operations of the SCHSL.
- CIA will keep the Commissioner and the League apprised of any proposed legislation that may impact the operations of the League.
- The Commissioner will meet with authors of proposed legislations early in the process in hopes of addressing their concerns prior to being placed on legislative committee agendas.

# SCHSL SPORTSMANSHIP

**Sportsmanship** is a key factor in the overall development of student-athletes during their education experience. It is through learning sportsmanship that athletes and coaches can deal with adversity in a positive way. The South Carolina High School League (SCHSL) challenges you to educate and instill the values of sportsmanship throughout your schools and communities. Education is the key to success and sportsmanship is not an exception.

Coaches and student-athletes learn the expectations set forth in our schools for handling adversity. Sportsmanship is imperative for growth and a requirement to remain part of the SCHSL. It's a positive mindset and productive lifestyle for both students and adults. The following criteria is used to determine a sportsmanship award winner: Community Service, Athlete & Coach Ejections, Sportsmanship/Leadership Summit Attendance, Sportsmanship Reports from other schools and/or officials and Sportsmanship within your student and fan sections at events. We have now incorporated sportsmanship pledges for students and coaches. These pledges can be found under the sportsmanship tab on the SCHSL website.

- One person appointed by the legislative delegations of each congressional district.
- Members of the Appellate Panel may not concurrently serve as officers of any of the South Carolina High School League subdivisions, conferences or regions and may not have served as a member of the South Carolina High School League Executive Committee within the last three years.
- The Appellate Panel provides the final ruling in appeals brought against a decision on appeals from the Executive Committee of the League.
- Decisions made by the Appellate Panel are the final administrative appeal.

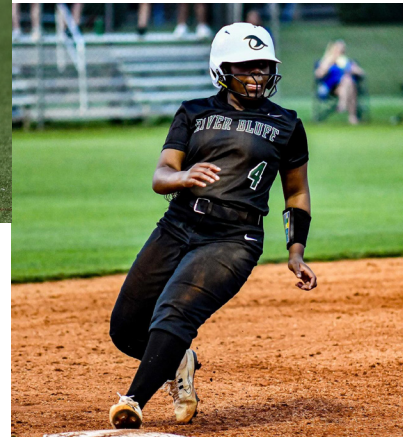

# Health, Safety, and Wellness

During the second year of existence, the Health, Safety, and Wellness department, the department dedicated solely to the health, safety, and wellness of the student-athletes of its membership in the South Carolina High School League (SCHSL) made major strides. While the safety and wellness of its student-athletes has always been a priority of the League, having a dedicated department allows the League to incorporate more national initiatives and provide useful tools on a broader scale. At the time of the department's development, it was only the second association in the country (North Carolina) to have such a department. This year, a mental health component was the focal point.

Several guidelines were developed and various national initiatives were carried out during the year.

- Emergency Action Plan (EAP) Week was held once per sport season (Fall, Winter, Spring): During this week, schools were encouraged to implement its EAP during practices to help better prepare them in the event of an emergency. Additionally, the staff of the SCHSL participated and practiced its own EAP. During the Fall EAP all staff members were trained in CPR/AED use.
- Medical timeout documentation was developed for schools to utilize throughout the year: This is a document which can be utilized by key stakeholders (athletic trainers, coaches, officials, administration) for pre-event medical meetings to plan for emergencies.
- Coordinated the NFHS Foundation AED program to distribute AED's to schools across the state.
- Worked with SCATA and SC Medical Aspect of Sports committee to approve lacrosse chest protection for practices, review concussion law, and the 4-quarter full in football.
- Hosted the US Center for Mental Health and Sport, as they provided a free two hour certification course.
- Worked with concussion experts and the brain injury association on updates to the existing concussion law.
- Worked with the American Heart Association on the development and review of the "Heart Smart" Act, which would require AED's to be at athletic events.



# OFFICIALS' INFORMATION

During the 2024-25 year, the Officials' Spotlight was introduced. Throughout the year, the SCHSL shined the spotlight on the unsung heroes of high school sports, our officials. Once a month, profiles of the SCHSL officials from different sports were included in the weekly E-Newsletter (TuesNews), so the membership could get to know the officials and why they do what they do.

Also in the 2024-25 year, the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame (SCAHOF) awarded the Bobby Richardson Sportsmanship Award to all South Carolina High School League (SCHSL) high school sports officials. The honor, which was given in recognition of the officials' hardwork and dedication to high school sports, was bestowed on all the officials of the League.

Additionally, the Bench Bad Behavior and Become an Official Campaigns, which were introduced during the 2023-24 year, were continued in 2024-25. The Bench Bad Behavior Campaign included PA announcements, posters, and videos to promote positive behavior and discourage poor sportsmanship at contests by spectators, coaches, and student-athletes. The Become an Official Campaign included several social media pushes throughout the year to encourage people to join the ranks of the officiating world. Both campaigns were held in conjunction with the NFHS.

# EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

During the 2024-25 school year, the South Carolina High School League (SCHSL) Educational Services Department was intentional about educating our coaches and student-athletes on the importance of sportsmanship, leadership, health, and community service. The SCHSL provided multiple opportunities for our student-athlete's education and growth. Through workshops and summits, the student-athletes were given tools to help them not only succeed in the sports world but also in life.

The Educational Services Department is also instrumental in providing opportunities for schools to carryout its community service initiatives.

## **Captains' Workshops**

Captains' Workshops were available for all sports and all seasons. The experience for our student-athletes was unparalleled this year. Many of our speakers were former SCHSL student-athletes who spoke to the heart of the challenges that student-athletes face. Topics ranged from the pitfalls of social media, becoming a leader, self confidence, stress management, and how to manage adversity both on and off the field of play. Student-athletes were able to ask questions and felt seen and heard.

## **Living Clean Weeks**

Living Clean Weeks are periods set aside throughout the school year that are geared toward community service. It is a chance for student-athletes to show leadership and establish healthy practices around their school. We had three Living Clean Weeks in 2024-25 year and they were highly successful. Member schools around the state participated in stadium, gymnasium and highway clean ups. Some schools took this time to appreciate officials, SROs, and facility staff members.

## **Summits**

There were three summits this year, Health Summit, Middle School Summit, and Leadership Summit. The SCHSL was intentional this year about speaking to the needs of the student-athletes. We covered topics about intrinsic vs. extrinsic motivation, maintaining mental wellness, and suicide prevention. We had healthcare professionals take questions from student-athletes and give them practical tools they can use to handle tough situations.



# STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL



**2024-25 Student-Athlete Advisory Council**

In the year after it's reactivation (2024-25), the **Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC)** was very productive. Once again, student-athletes were selected from all over the state, from all classifications and sports. During the 2024-25 year, the members of SAAC created videos on sportsmanship and leadership, volunteered at championships and four of our members were selected to attend the 2025 NFHS National Student Leadership Summit in Indianapolis.

Two major activities for SAAC during the 2024-25 year, was serving as speakers for the Virtual Middle School Leadership Summit in the Fall and hosting their first-ever in-person Middle School Leadership Summit in the Spring.

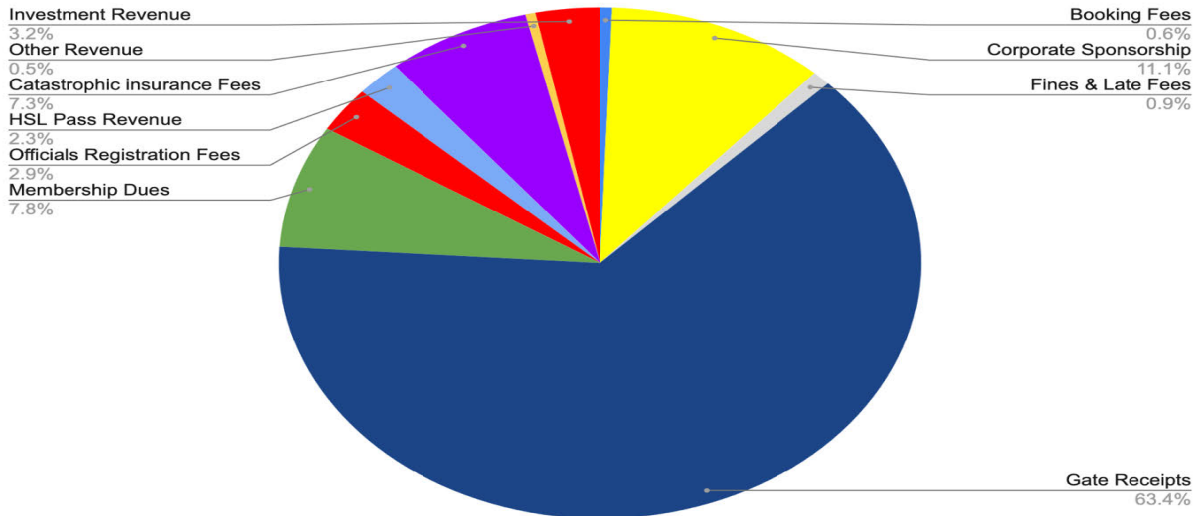

### Revenue Sources

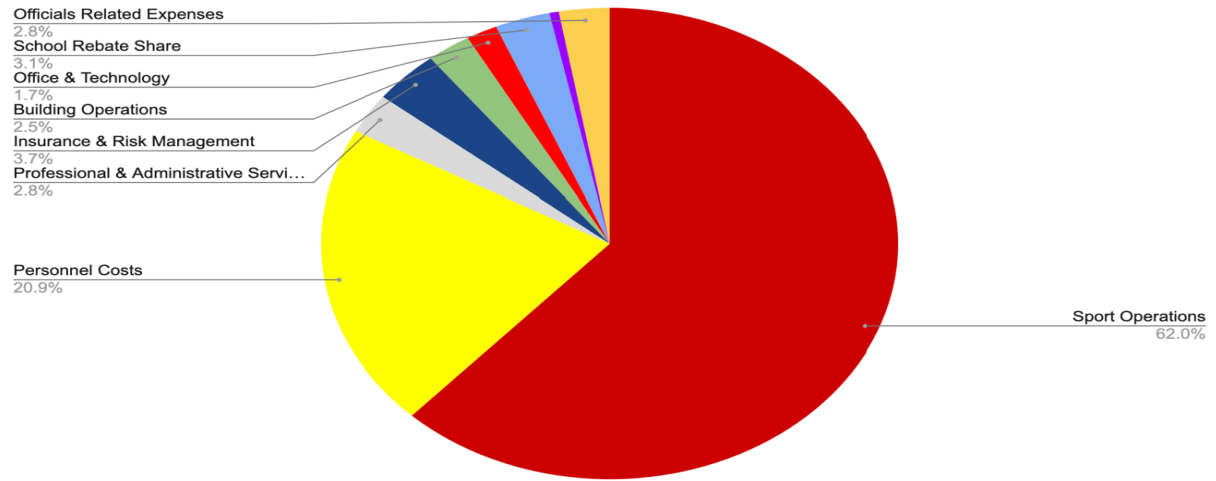
